P&C Principal's Report

This has been a busy and challenging term for us here at Cheso. Thank you to all of our school community for supporting us to provide a safe, respectful, learning environment for our students where we can all feel a sense of belonging.

Highlights for me since our last newsletter include:

On the Wednesday of Week 5 we had our Year Meetings. This involves each Year spending some time together with their Year Advisor and other key members of staff to focus on topics that are specifically for them. For example Year 12 might focus on HSC issues, Year 7 and 9 on NAPLAN and so on. We try to also use these assemblies to celebrate student success and also have some student performances. These assemblies happen each term in Week 5 and are run by members of the Student Representative Council (SRC) members of each year group.

On Monday 22 February we had our Vietnamese Parents meeting with in excess of 30 people attending. This meeting was held a week later than usual due to a clash with Vietnamese New Year. The main topic

were our 2009 HSC and School Certificate results and other highlights of the previous year.

On Wednesday 3 March we held our usual informal "Meet the Teachers" event after school in the hall. It was an opportunity to put a name to a face or two and to discuss any issues parents or teachers might have. It was great to see so many parents and staff and this meeting. On display at the meeting was the artwork from our "100 Faces, 100 Stories" project last year. Everyone was so impressed by the work of our Year 9 and IEC "100 Faces" team.

On Thursday 4 March we held or Pacific Community Parents meeting our numbers are on the rise and we look forward to more families joining us next term.

On Tuesday 9 march and Wednesday 10 March we had the Annuual General Meetings of our P&C and our School Council.

On Monday 15 March our Arabic Parents group was well attended and Mrs Corish our P&C President spoke about the role of the P&C and welcomed familiar parents back to our school year of 2010 and welcomed some new parents of Year 7 students.

On Tuesday we welcomed a large number of Year 6 students, teachers and parents from our partner primary schools for our annual Year 6 Open Day. All were welcomed, given a tour of the school and sampled some high school lessons. This was followed by an evening session for interested parents and children who were unable to attend in the daytime.

National Partnerships: we have already employed 4 new teachers to assist us to run our National Partnerships projects this year:

Ms. Fenton: to work on the Refugee Transition Program and Year 110 students who need assistance in meeting School Certificate requirements

Mr. Elakkoumi: to assist the learning needs of our ESL students

We are looking to interview for some executive positions this week to complete our National Partnerships Team.

For the information of families seeking enrolment in Year 7 at Chester Hill High School

Dear Parents/Caregivers

Chester Hill High School is a very popular local school and our enrolment procedures at the school follow the NSW Education Department Enrolment Policy.

Local students are determined by the Department's boundaries. Families seeking local area enrolment for their child will fill out an Expression of Interest Form (EOI) and this will be forwarded to the high school. Later in the year we will contact these families and ask for an "Application to Enrol" form to be filled in and sent back to us with **3 pieces of documentary evidence** to show that **the family and the student** live within our boundaries. If students are not living with their family, custody verification or other formal documentation will be required to establish "local" status. Examples of appropriate evidence include: rates notices, rental agreements, Centrelink letters, electricity/gas bills, letters from government agencies and banks. Once these forms have been processed satisfactorily students will be offered a place at Chester Hill High School as a local enrolment.

Non-local students who do not live within our local boundaries, may apply for "Non-local secondary school placement" in line with the Department's policy, by completing Section C of the Expression of Interest Form (EOI). A placement panel at the high school, including a parent from the school, will consider all non-local applications. Factors which will guide the panel's decision will include:

Living close to the school

Brothers or sisters already enrolled at the school

Disability or medical-related reasons

Safety and supervision of the student before and after school

Availability of subjects or combinations of subjects

Special interests and abilities

Compassionate circumstances

The structure and organisation of the school

These are in line with the department's policy and are not in any specific order of importance. **There are no guarantees regarding non-local enrolment** but families who wish to apply should consider the above factors in the "Reasons" box in Section C of the EOI. Families are encouraged to add additional information for the enrolment panel to consider to support a non-local placement eg NAPLAN results, school reports, students leadership roles held.

There will only be non-local places if these are not required by local students. If there are non-local places the panel will meet and families will be informed of the outcome of their application.

During the weekend of Friday 12 March to Sunday 14 March, five students from Chester Hill High School participated in the UNYA (NSW) State Conference 2010 held at Collaroy Conference Centre and Macquarie University. These five students participated in talks, discussions and several rounds of vigorous debates as representatives of different countries.

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"Cheso Hero: Ex student"

Gallant driver saves woman from drowning

A 26-YEAR-OLD woman had a lucky escape in Cabramatta yesterday after her car careened off the road into a deep water-filled ditch.

The woman was driving along John St around 1.30pm when a 19-year-old male in another vehicle drove through a stop sign on Coventry St and crashed into her black BMW X5, which spun across the road and into a water-filled excavation on a lot which used to house an old petrol station.

Completely submerged and trapped in her seat, the woman was rescued by passer-by **Andrew Duong** who was driving behind her.

"I was driving behind them and I saw the crash and pulled them out," he said.

The woman thanked **Mr Duong** for saving her life. "He is a very brave gentleman," she said. "I couldn't get out. Thank you very much."

A police spokesman confirmed the incident.

"The two of them collided at the intersection," he said. "She has, as a result, left the carriageway and her car has gone into this pool of water."

He said no one was injured in the crash, but said the male driver would be slapped with a fine of \$253 and lose three demerit points
