## Principal's Report

We ended Term 1 with a highly successful and well attended School Cross Country Carnival held at Pioneer Park in beautiful Autumn weather. I hope all our readers enjoyed a restful break over the holidays.

**Our joint Staff Development Day** on 19 April was an interesting change for teachers. We met with the staff of Sefton and Birrong Girls high schools to discuss how we can best meet the learning needs of our students. We met in cross school and faculty groups to discuss "Exceptional Outcomes" achieved by schools and had the opportunity to listen to **Professor Steve Dinham** in the final session. He spoke about what the research is telling us about effective teaching and learning and strategies that really work to improve student learning outcomes.

This initiative is part of our **National Partnerships** program. This program runs for 4 years: 2010-2013 and brings considerable funding to the school. In a previous Cheso News I listed the extra teaching staff we are employing with these funds. **Our 4 projects over the four years are:** 

1. To develop, implement and evaluate a school-wide Reading Plan to improve overall literacy outcomes as measured by NAPLAN, School Certificate and Higher School Certificate

2. To develop, implement and evaluate strategies and programs to enhance student engagement in Stages 5 and 6

3. To further develop, implement and evaluate ESL pedagogy across all KLAs

# 4. To further address the needs of Gifted and Talented students



# No knives at school

# March 2010



# There's no good reason to bring a knife to school.

NSW now has the toughest knife laws in Australia. As a parent, you need to be aware of these laws, as you can also be charged if you allow your child to carry a knife.

# No knives allowed at school under any circumstances.

- If a student has a knife at school the principal may call the police.
- The student may be expelled or suspended immediately. Possessing a knife includes your child simply having one in their bag or locker. Having a knife for self-protection is also illegal. If you are concerned about your child's wellbeing or safety, contact the principal.
- Tough penalties apply for kids convicted of knife offences, including jail sentences of up to 25 years if someone is injured with a knife during an assault.



# What kind of knives are prohibited?

School policy is designed to keep all students safe, and so no type of knife is allowed at school. That means no butter knives or fruit knives in lunchboxes, or knife tools for craft purposes.

- Flick knives, ballistic knives, sheath knives, push daggers, trench knives, butterfly knives, star knives are all prohibited.
- Your child cannot bring to school any item that can be used as a weapon (such as a chisel).
- In lessons requiring the use of knives, for example cooking or trades, your child's teacher will supply and supervise the use of the tools.
- There are some senior subjects, such as hospitality, where kids may be required to have their own knives. Your child's school will advise you about these courses and the procedures for carrying knives legally to and from school and TAFE.

## The law makes parents responsible

You need to make certain your child is aware of the school's rules and the State laws about knives.

If you allow your child to carry or possess a knife at school or in a public place, you can be charged.

- The police can search any child they suspect of having a knife.
   They can confiscate any dangerous object they might find during the search.
- Your child must comply with such a police search, or they may be arrested and charged.
- It is also illegal for anyone to sell a knife to anyone who is less than 16 years old.

Every child has the right to feel safe and secure at school. There is no good reason for them to ever have a knife at school.

### **Commerce Excursion**

On Friday, 30th of April, Year 9 and 10 Commerce students travelled to the city to learn about the NSW State Parliament and court system.

In the morning, a guided tour of the NSW State Parliament was arranged and we were shown the House of Representatives and the Senate. In the House of Representatives, students had the opportunity to do a role play and students were given the roles of the Speaker and various parliamentary members including our premier, **Ms Kristina Keneally**. The role play was interesting as students were able to behave like politicians. It was also surprising to find out the extent to which some politicians go to to shame their opponents so their party can win the next election.

The most fascinating thing in the Senate was a special chair intricately carved out Australian cedar wood and it looked like a throne. We were later told that only the **Queen of England** or her royal representatives would be allowed to sit in it. It looked very extravagant and the students found it intriguing.



After lunch at Martin Place, some students visited the Supreme Court whilst others visited the district or local courts in the Downing Centre. We were split up into smaller groups and were allowed to witness criminal trials or bail hearings. We also discovered some court room etiquette, for example all court attendees must respectfully bow at the judge after entering or before leaving the court room, and must be absolutely silent during the proceedings. My group watched a convicted drug addict being trailed, and she was sentenced to an 18month good behaviour bond. Another group witnessed a murder trial, in which the defendant was found guilty and sentenced to 45 years in a high security prison. We all found it very interesting, and wanted to stay longer. As a result of our lagging, we ended up missing our train. All in all, it was a very gratifying experience that contributed significantly to our learning.

Work experience is important for your child. It may show them the career path that they would like to follow or it may show them that certain jobs look wonderful until you have to do them. Both of these conclusions are valuable discoveries for your child to make.

If there are difficulties finding a host employer, send your child to see me. It would be very unfortunate if your child misses out on this opportunity and must spend the work experience week at school.
