NATIONAL PARTNERSHIPS UPDATE

Congratulations to **Mr Jones** who was successful in gaining the position of Head Teacher Teaching and Learning under the National Partnerships Program.

Mr Jones will now work closely with all staff and students to continue enhancing the teaching and learning experiences at Cheso.

Below is an update of what we have been working on so far under National Partnerships and also the projects we are soon to commence.

Literacy and Engagement.

We are very lucky to have Associate Professor **Wayne Sawyer** from the UWS as our Academic Partner under the National Partnerships Program. Associate Professor Sawyer was the guest presenter at our Staff Development Day on the 19th July, where he elaborated on specific reading strategies that we can use across all KLAs (Key Learning Areas) which will improve students' knowledge and understanding.

Over the next semester each faculty will be focusing on 2 reading strategies and incorporate these in their programs. It is expected that by the end of the year students will have been exposed to a variety of strategies which will improve their reading skills.

Student Engagement

- <u>Yr11 Student Engagement</u> Interviews are continuing and we have been successful in transitioning a few students into alternate pathways such as TAFE and Traineeships.
- <u>Yr 10 interviews</u> are under way for students who are struggling with school work and assistance is being provided to catch up on missed work and redeem N Awards.
- Various activities and excursions have been organised for <u>Refugee Students</u> and continued support for students through withdrawal. Students were also involved in the making of a quilt which was presented to the school during our Flag Day Ceremony.
- ATSI (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) Students have been involved in celebrations of Reconciliation Week and NAIDOC week. The School celebrated NAIDOC week by incorporating aspects of the Indigenous Culture into their lessons/programs. Some examples of students' work is on display in the library.
- We have organised for various inspirational speakers from the community to talk to our students on careers and future pathways.
- Discussions are underway to have a mural painted by our students under the guidance of Aboriginal Artist **Mrs Janice Bruny**.
- <u>Technology</u> Continued installation of IWB – Interactive WhiteBoards, (the school now has 37 IWBs and 3 connected classrooms). The majority of the school has access to wireless

internet and we have started to use our new Language Centre, which is also a Connected classroom.

Staff will be provided with training and development of their ICT skills and incorporating technology into their programs. Thus providing our students access to the latest technology.

ESL Pedagogy

Our aim for this semester is to further develop and implement ESL pedagogy across all KLAs through additional assistance in classes, resource development and ESL Pedagogy training of staff.

Gifted and Talented Program (GAT)

- Variety of opportunities for students to participate in extension activities.
- Future projects in GAT still under development.

Parent/Community Involvement

We had our inaugural Parent workshop on Thursday 22 July and will be having our second meeting on Thursday 5th August. These meetings are a forum for parents to get advice and assistance from the school and our District School Liaison Officer on any issues they may have concerning their child. They will also provide parents with practical skills such as computer literacy, dealing with stress, dealing with teenagers, cyber bullying and the sort.

These workshops will take place every 2^{nd} Thursday at 9.30 am , and all parents are invited to attend.

On Wednesday 4th August we had our first Indigenous Parent Evening and we were very pleased to see so many members of our Indigenous community present. Among the guests was **Mr Nathan Towney**, Aboriginal Education Team Education Officer for South

We want to continue strengthening our links with our Indigenous families by providing forums such as these evenings, which will take place once a term in the library.

Technical Support Phone Scam Warning

Memorandum to: Principals **DN/10/00224**

<u>The information in this memorandum</u> <u>should be passed on to any students, parents</u> <u>and staff members who use computers at</u> <u>home.</u>

Concerns have been raised by parents about phone calls from cold callers, pretending to represent Microsoft, who attempt to scare people into believing that their computer has been infected by a virus.

The callers can be quite convincing and persistent. They take advantage of basic fears about online security. Their aim is to convince people to agree to use a credit card to pay for an online technical support and virus repair service.

The caller attempts to direct people to a remote access website by claiming that it will assist the caller to clean up the virus problem and install the technical support service. Not only is the service they provide a sham and based on deception, it can leave a computer more vulnerable to malicious attacks. Please let your students and parents know that this type of call is a scam. These scammers have nothing to do with the Department or Microsoft. The best thing to do is to hang up on these callers.

It is not possible for any departmental computer to be monitored remotely by these callers, including the DER laptops when being used at home. Remote access websites are already blocked by DER and DET web filters. It is impossible for external companies to load software onto DER computers.

Changing problems into opportunities for skills development

As adults we often forget what it was really like to be a child. We might have memories about events but we often forget that all the wisdom and knowledge that has been learnt along the way and that it did not come easily. We often expect our children to be able to manage all kinds of situations without difficulties and then become frustrated when they have problems.

The most common reason parents seek help from Parent Line is in managing their child's behaviour. Parents often feel embarrassed to tell other people that they are struggling with their child's behaviour. They feel it could be seen as a reflection on their parenting capabilities.

Parents sometimes blame it on others "It's the teacher that's causing my child to behave like that" or "She's bored at school so she misbehaves" etc. We as parents have all done that!

At Parent Line we suggest to parents that a very effective way of working with the problem is to view the problem as an opportunity for the child to learn skills. It might be a process of self discovery or it might be about learning relationship skills, problem solving skills or even help seeking skills.

This approach is about understanding that children can't know how to manage every situation. It is acknowledging that we all continue to learn and develop throughout life and that mistakes are just opportunities to learn. If the mistakes continue to happen then the learning isn't happening.

It helps eliminate some of the frustration and gives parents a different mindset that has an outcome. Instead of being just the disciplinarian, parents take on roles such as coach, mentor, limit setters and the child's cheer squad all in one.

This method creates opportunities for relationship building and closeness between the parent and child. It helps parents to break down the issue into parts that they feel that they can influence. There are many steps along the way that help parents put this into practise.


