Principal's Report

50th Anniversary

Chester Hill HS is celebrating 50 years service to our community and the plans for our 50th Anniversary are well underway. The important dates for this wonderful event are Friday 14th September and Saturday 15th September when there will be a reunion dinner at the Fairfield RSL club from 7:00pm. The Friday will be devoted to students and the Saturday we will be open to the public. Leading up to the event will be a whole school photo on the oval in the shape of a '50' on Monday 4th June. We have also planned a memorial garden in front of D block to mark the occasion. Over the two days there will be many different activities. There will be multicultural food and sausage sizzles, concerts, memorabilia for sale, static displays including historical, photographs, school magazines, the Cheso museum and student work including classroom displays. There will be constant updates on the website. We have started to upload historical photos from each of the decades 60s, 70s, 80s and the display is

very comprehensive. I would like to thank **Michael Barnes**, our communication officer, for his initiative in this area.

NAPLAN

On the 15th, 16 and 17th of May, all year Year 7 and 9 students will undertake their NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, language conventions and numeracy. The outcomes of these tests will be distributed to you when the school receives them in August. These tests are measures of what the students can and can't do in terms of their literacy and numeracy. The reading and numeracy tests difficult questions, many called have discriminators, meaning that only a small percentage of the students will get the question right. One of the myths surrounding NAPLAN is that it is about basic literacy and In fact, the opposite is true. numeracy. NAPLAN is not about basic literacy but about identifying the 'higher order' skills with which students struggle. These skills include connecting ideas, inferring main ideas, synthesizing ideas to interpret message,

interpreting ideas and interpreting the main purpose of texts. This is the modern day concept of literacy. NAPLAN is used as a diagnostic process used by teachers to help identify skills that need to be taught and practiced. These skills underpin the work that students do in Years 10, 11 and 12. At CHHS we are committed to developing these very skills because they are used throughout people's lives. So the 'one off' test on 'one day' has real-life application for a very long time.

At CHHS this year we have given every Year 7 and 9 student a NAPLAN trial that closely resembles the format and question types of the actual NAPLAN test. We have provided teachers with training and resources to help students and provide them with feedback on their performance. We have also included a separate page in the half-yearly report that outlines how your son or daughter has performed in this process. While the actual NAPLAN result will be sent to you in August, we are confident that the NAPLAN trial report given to you in late June in the half yearly report will reflect that result. I would like to thank the staff for co-operating in this matter.

Reports

Term 2 is always assessing and reporting time and there are some important dates coming up. On Monday 28th May there will be Years 12/11 Parent teacher night and on Wednesday 27th June the Years 7-11 Parent Teacher night. Year 12 reports will be distributed on the night. Please note that no Year 11 reports will be distributed on Monday 28th May. The purpose of the evening for Year 11 students is to provide an opportunity for parents to see teachers and to get an update on their progress.

At CHHS, we take great pride in the quality of our reports. Every report is created and checked by the teacher, checked by the Head Teacher, checked by the Year Adviser and read by the Principal. They go out under my signature as a quality assurance measure. The reports also contain the extra-curricula activities with which our students engage. For this year for our Year 7 and 9 students, there is also an additional page on the NAPLAN trial results.

CHHS Community Forum

On Tuesday 8th May, a combined meeting of the School Council and the Parents and Citizens representative groups was held to further the discussions about forming one representative body. The suggested name for the new body is the CHHS Community Forum. In the meeting the purpose and aims of the new body were discussed. The purpose of the new body would be: **To build our learning community so that each student is supported through quality teaching and leaning so that they can:**

- become lifelong learners
- be active citizens
- be ethical decision makers
- value their multicultural heritage

The role of the new body would cover the following roles:

- assisting in determining school policies
- helping to identify educational needs and priorities
- promoting a positive image of the school in the local community
- liaising with and communicating regularly with the local community
- reflecting the multicultural heritage of the community
- raising concerns about issues that affect students

In fulfilling these roles, you can see the CHHS Community Forum would have an important part to play in the school. I would like the Forum to reflect the diversity of the school population and therefore it is planned

to have cultural groups represented as well as students from our SRC. There are plans to include presentations so that the community is kept informed of developments across a wide spectrum of educational issues. The meetings are open to all parents and I would consider urge you to your active The meeting participation. next is scheduled for Tuesday, the 19th June at 5:00pm.

With Flag Day on the horizon this Term and the 50th Anniversary at the end of Term 3 we look forward to a busy and productive time.

National Partnerships

Term 2 Report

Our National Partnerships aim is to continue to improve our students' literacy and numeracy outcomes and offer them the best learning environment and experiences.

A warm welcome to **Ms Chris Michels**, she is the new SLSO working with some of our refugee students.

At the end of Term 1, we conducted a trial of the NAPLAN exams for Years 7 & 9. This provided students with an opportunity to practise for the real thing, but also to identify the areas where they were struggling or needed extra assistance. All students received meaningful feedback in their English and Maths classes, as well as a presentation in Science on the skills needed to answer multiple choice questions. A huge thank you to all the teachers who were involved in the marking of the papers and who provided the feedback to our students. Students reported that they benefited from this opportunity and feel more confident about the real NAPLAN. The results of the trial will be reported in the students' halfyearly reports.

Thanks to National Partnerships' funding, Cheso students have access to the latest technology in interactive learning. We recently purchased new software, which allows students to interact with the lesson on the board by typing in their answers onto individual devices that they each have in their hands, similar to mobile phones. We have purchased a site license for the program called ACTIVINSPIRE and 4 class sets of the individual devices (one set for the IEC). The teachers prepare their lessons on this software and students work independently to answer using their "gadgets".

Then, these results can be used by the teacher for assessment of learning or shared with the class. Some of our students have already had access to lessons using these devices and were very excited and engaged. As more teachers get trained and confident in using them, the program will be used widely across the school. This software adds to our already regards well equipped school in to We have over 30 Interactive technology. Whiteboards. Wireless Internet, a media projector and computer in every classroom and the newly purchased Apple laptops and software for film development and editing. State of the art resources! We are all very fortunate indeed.

Staff continue to participate in courses at the school that will enhance the learning experiences of our students. Some of our teachers have just finished the "Teaching refugees in my classroom" course, others are in the middle of the TELL (Teaching English Language Learners) course, and others are working on SMART2 data analysis, Middle Band teaching strategies, Activinspire workshops and the list goes on.

This term is definitely a very busy time for our teachers and students with assessment and reporting. A huge thank you to both staff and students for all your hard work.






To experience flying was so different than what I used to think; that wonderful experience made me believe that I can do it if I work actively towards my goal.




I thank and really appreciate *Mrs Liau* and *Mosa* for such a great opportunity that they have granted me.






Dear Parents/Guardians.
