Principal's Report

50th Anniversary

CHHS Community Forum

After a long series of negotiations, the two parent representative groups, the CHHS School Council and the P&C, have decided to amalgamate to form one representative body called the CHHS Community Forum. There is a draft constitution that has been written to guide the operations of the Forum. I would like to thank one of our parents, **Mr Doug Melville** for 'steering' this tricky process. The purpose of the Forum will be to:

- assist in determining school policies
- help identify educational needs and priorities
- promote a positive image of the school in the local community
- liaise and communicate regularly with the local community
- provide advice on multicultural issues

raise concerns about issues that affect students

The Forum is not a fund raising body and is open to all parents. The next meeting to elect office bearers will be on Tuesday, 11th September. I would like to personally encourage participation in the forum. CHHS is open and transparent about its processes and policies and we welcome parent and community input into the operations of the school. In the next few meetings policies such as anti-bullying and Yrs.7-10 assessment will be discussed. The Forum meetings will be held twice a Term throughout the year.

PISA

On the 15th August 25 students took part in the 2012 Program for International Student Assessment (PISA). We were chosen to be one of the Australian schools whose students are compared to other OECD country schools. PISA ranks all countries in the OECD in terms of their literacy, Maths and Science education performance. On the 2009 figures. Australia ranked seventh in literacy and Science and fourteenth in Maths. The Prime Minister recently announced that a long term educational goal for Australia is to move into the top five of all three categories. I would like to thank Ms Bhamjee, our HT Teaching and Learning for organising the event so smoothly.

Intensive English Centre

Over the past few weeks, I have had the privilege of being part of two outstanding educational events, the first IEC bushwalk and the second inter-IEC Oratory competition. The bushwalk involved every person in the IEC including teachers and support staff and was part of a 'rich task' assessment covering Science, Social Science, History and English. The day was an outstanding success with all enjoying the sunny conditions. The day was again

superbly supported by the team from **Optus**, our Australian Business Council Network (ABCN) partner and the CEO of Optus, Mr Andrew Buay. 35 Optus volunteers and two Aboriginal educators also took part. I would like to thank Optus once again for their generosity of both spirit and donation of time. Our students experienced the Australian bush (many for the first time), completed a detailed worksheet that required them to identify Australian native flora and fauna and had an excellent BBQ lunch. Aspects of Aboriginal craft and lore were explained and demonstrated. I would like to personally thank everybody who took part in this special event for your care and dedication to these vulnerable students.

The second outstanding event was the second inter-IEC Oratory competition. Our students competed against other IECs by delivering a three minute speech on a topic of their choice. Every time I attend an IEC oratory final, be it a class, centre or inter-IEC competition, I am amazed by the high standard. These students cannot speak English when they arrive in Australia and to see them six months later, addressing a large crowd with confidence and style is truly inspirational. Many, many native-born citizens of this country are terrified of speaking before an audience. For IEC students the effort is doubly difficult but through excellent teaching and coaching they rise to and surpass this challenge. The standard of the speeches and their delivery in the inter-IEC competition was extremely high. Our IEC student, Fatama (Kane) Bah finished third from 17 speakers which was a very meritorious achievement. Again, I would like to thank all members of the IEC from the teachers, support staff and students for their enthusiastic support of this event. Everybody gets involved and the IEC team keep setting new benchmarks in achievement.

NAB Schools First grant

Last month, CHHS received a grant of \$15,000 from the National Australia Bank for our High Achievers Class (HAC). Working with our University of Western Sydney academic partner, **Dr Diana Whitton**, we were successful in convincing the panel that our high achieving students were capable of being further challenged through rich task assessments. Congratulations to **Ms Pikoulas** for her submission writing skills!

CHHS Yr. 7 Scholarships

National Partnerships Update – Term 3 2012

It's hard to believe we are reaching the end of Term 3, and once again it is time for our school community to assist us in the Evaluation of the National Partnerships programs.

This is an important time to evaluate the various programs we have running in the school and receive valuable feedback on the initiatives that are currently in place. process of data gathering is crucial in helping us plan for next year as well as in assisting our school in preparing our school plan. We have surveyed a cross section of our students, selected at random from different classes, staff, parents and community members. Thank you to all the parents who have already completed surveys. Students are being encouraged to return these promptly by being awarded house points for each of the surveys returned. So get those surveys in. If any of our parents or community members wish to complete a survey, these are available from the front office.

Survey results will be communicated to our community in next term's newsletter.

Our teachers continue to participate in various workshops and initiatives aimed at improving the learning outcomes of our students. We continue teacher professional development with the Middle Band Team, TELL Program, Teaching Refugees in my classroom, ICT Skills and ESL Pedagogy workshops. All these workshops are aimed at building our teacher capacity to improve our students' overall learning outcomes.

We have been successful in organising a number of Community of Schools meetings with our local primary schools and Community Liaison Officers (CLOs). These will assist with student transition to the high school as well as providing all parties with professional development opportunities. Two such opportunities have involved both our staff and students. Our Year 10 Visual Arts group, accompanied by **Ms Fenton** went to

Villawood North Primary School to lead workshops in Artmaking with the students. Our teachers will be visiting Chester Hill North Primary School to participate in their Intensive Numeracy Workshops so they can implement some of those strategies in our middle school to assist in transition as well as improving our numeracy skills in Years 7 & 8. We will be hosting all of the Year 5 students from our primary schools next term for taster lessons and an early experience of high school.

The IEC and High School Experience program with Industrial Arts, Visual Arts and Drama has proven to be very successful and popular. As some of the students from the IEC are given the opportunity to come to the high school and have lessons in the specialist rooms, or some of our specialist teachers go to the IEC to teach these subjects. These have proven valuable to assist students in their transition to high school.

The Yr 7 High Achievers Class (HAC) have been working on some very exciting projects as part of their diversified curriculum experiences. They presented their DVD film project to the Red Cross and are currently working on an online virtual museum using the relics in **Mr Brown's** History museum. They are very excited about this project as they discover items that are "ancient"! The students are also looking forward to visiting their primary schools to talk about their high school experiences.

We want to continue strengthening our partnership with our community and continue delivering excellent teaching and learning experiences to our students.

Open Gallery

On Friday 24th August 7V, 7B and 7R went to the Art Gallery of NSW for the OPEN GALLERY excursion. This was the first Year Seven group to go and the second group will be going in October.

Kirsty Stones (7V) writes a recount of the excursion:

I found the Art Gallery excursion very entertaining and informative. The background information about the artworks made me look at them in a different way and appreciate the artworks even more. My favourite artwork would have to be by Janet Laurence "In Memory of Nature". I was also privileged to see an artwork of Margaret Olley by Ben Quilty which won the Archibald prize in 2010. Before the excursion and seeing pictures of this magnificent artwork, I believed every stroke was carefully executed and fine, when actually each stroke was thick and in different directions. When you are up close to this painting, you can't imagine it winning the Archibald Prize but when you take a step back you can see why it won the prize. You can see it come together with all the beauty and delicateness. We received the chance to sketch bits and pieces of the artworks we saw and it was great that we did that because we were able to really connect with the artwork and artist and really appreciate them for the time and effort they put in. It gives us, the audience, a chance to see and interpret their artworks. I learned a lot from this excursion, for example, how long it takes to complete an artwork and how difficult it is. I would like to thank the Art teachers and Art Gallery for giving us this opportunity and for making this great experience for not only me but for all the other Year Sevens. Queenie Bui: My favourite painting was The Memory of Nature by Janet Laurence. It was really unique. I liked how she put the tall black flowers and stem in a glass case. I want some in my room.
