We have recently submitted our last evaluation report for the Low SES National Partnership. This was the last evaluation report as the program, for us, concludes at the end of this year. If parents and students are interested, the report can be read on the school website. It is very detailed and is a credit to the hard work of Ms Mateus, our Deputy Principal who has expertly guided the program for those four years. What I would like to concentrate upon is how we are going to sustain many of the successful initiatives.

We are going to maintain the third Deputy Principal position throughout 2014. This position has brought many benefits to the school including increased attention to individual student welfare needs, stronger support for teachers and a significant reduction in the number of suspensions. We will also maintain the Head Teacher, Student Engagement position as this initiative has had a direct increase in our community's participation in the school and it has had a

significant increase in the participation rate of a number of 'at-risk' students and thereby maintaining our healthy attendance rates.

For our Aboriginal or refugee students, the programs will continue for 2014 embedding them in the Learning Support program. We will also continue with the School-to-Work Transition Adviser position as this is vital to meeting the needs of a significant number of our senior students. When the mandatory school leaving age was raised to 17 years, students who would have traditionally moved to vocational education had to stay at school. It is an important service to our community that we retain the ability to make flexible arrangements for the welfare of these students. The Transition Adviser position will be funded through our global funds. We will also have the on-going benefit of a number of initiatives funded through the National Partnership Program. There is a much more integrated approach between the high school and the IEC, our website will be much more informative and interactive and we will have grown even stronger links to our Primary Partner schools.

One of the lasting benefits of the program is the Professional Learning afforded to our staff. 85% of staff have completed the Teaching English Language Learners (TELL) program and 50% have completed the Refugees my Classroom Teaching in program. The entire staff have completed the Team Leadership for School Improvement course. There have been many, many courses undertaken by staff in curriculum, leadership, literacy, numeracy, ICT, gifted & talented education, special education and student welfare which has increased the school's capacity to meet the challenges of a constantly evolving educational landscape.

#### **School Contributions**

Thank you to all parents who have promptly paid the voluntary school contribution of \$40 this year. It is vitally important that we receive as much money as possible from this scheme. The previous section of my report outlined the generous National Partnership program that has contributed much to the school. The funds of this program are tied funds, which mean that we have no discretion about how we expend them. Over the years, we have mainly spent our global funds (discretionary funds) on classroom improvements such as air-conditioning. Just recently we received notice of our 2014 budget. We have been given around \$55,000 for our electricity bills. Our annual electricity bill is around \$130,000 and we have to make up the difference from our global funds. The average voluntary contribution government schools across the state is \$93. In comparison with other state high schools our voluntary contribution is very modest. For example, Bossley Park HS has an upfront fee of \$360. Could those families who have yet to make the contribution please do so because the money directly impacts upon the quality of education here at CHHS.

# **Early University Entry**

I am pleased to announce that seven of our Yr.12 students have received early entry offers from the University of Sydney and the University of Technology. While this is an excellent achievement, this message is really intended for our current 2014 HSC students and their families. Each year, universities

offer potential places to students before the HSC. The universities are required by Federal Government to offer places to students from low SES backgrounds and every institution has such a program. This does not mean that these early entry offers are easy to obtain. Students need to perform well at HSC level and sit for an interview before they are accepted. However, early entry processes are worth pursuing because they avoid anxiety at HSC time and there is excellent support here at CHHS to ensure that there are successful applications. # **National Partnerships Update**

Our National Partnership Funding draws to an official close this year. The program, which began in 2010, has funded many of our teaching and learning initiatives and programs, student welfare and support programs, parent workshops and activities and staff professional development and leadership opportunities. Over the last four years, we have kept you informed, through our Newsletters and Website, of the programs and initiatives that we have been thanks able to implement to this Partnership. We have consulted with the Cheso school community in our decision making process through surveys, discussion meetings groups, workshops and provided you with updates on our developments and achievements. This report aims at summarising our journey under the National Partnership Program and will hopefully highlight the wonderful programs and initiatives this funding has provided.

All students across the school have benefited greatly from the **National** Partnerships funding and this is most evident in our improved student outcomes. Changes in student outcomes have been noted in Literacy and Reading skills, achievement in course outcomes, improved feedback, assessment and general engagement in learning and improved quality of school life.

NAPLAN trend data for the current Year 7 indicated a greater than or equal to

expected student growth of 63% in Reading and 61% for Year 9. The school's Literacy Enhancement Program results indicated that 26.5% of the Year 7 students who participated in the program achieved band 8 in NAPLAN writing skills. Year 9 Literacy Enhancement Program students also made considerable improvement in persuasive writing with an average improvement of 18.3%.

As a direct result of the Partnership, there are tailored programs for Refugee and Aboriginal students and there is increased awareness by staff of the needs of these students. These students are now more engaged at school, they feel safer and welcomed in the school and have someone who supports them and looks after their welfare. They have ongoing support in the completion of assessments and homework through in-school assistance and the homework centre, as well as access to a number of cultural opportunities. Links with the Aboriginal Community resulted in the students being led by an Aboriginal artist to produce the Aboriginal Mural. The Aboriginal





students now perform annually at our Flag Day Ceremony, as well as at our Community of Schools. We often have Aboriginal Elders and other members of the community at the school to address our students, parents and community members. Our refugee students have been involved in various rich tasks, including Multicultural Writers Group, Drumming Workshop, Motivational Communication Workshop and Master Chef. From a welfare perspective, 26 students were successful in gaining Dept. of Housing Scholarships assist them in their to



schooling. Furthermore, they also have access to the Breakfast Club which operates in the school twice a week providing

students with breakfast and lunch on Mondays and Wednesdays. Thank you to Ms Apostle and Ms Fenton for their outstanding dedication and commitment to these students.

There are increased opportunities for our high achieving students with the introduction of the HAC (High Achievers Class) Initiative. This initiative provides students with the opportunities of project based learning and a high support, high challenge curriculum that will prepare them to become successful 21st Century learners. These students have access to a more innovative, project-based curriculum. Thev worked with academic partners from



the University of Western Sydney, as well as the Red Cross to create projects which are meaningful and current. We now offer two HAC scholarships to each of our Primary schools to encourage and support our high achieving students in our Community of Schools.

Availability and opportunity to access technology at school for all students, has meant that students are able to access and manipulate their learning experiences. There has been a shift in the quality and variety of teaching and learning experiences in the school with over 40 Interactive Whiteboards available in the classrooms. This has

increased students' relevance in the material being taught. Students have access to revision, quizzes and assessments online via "Chesoebox". An invention by our very talented Mr Criniti. Students also have access to "Mathletics" and "Mathsonline" and are able to use these at home as part of their revision and reinforcement. The Maths Faculty data shows a definite improvement in Numeracy outcomes for students who use this resource regularly.

The successful development of our new school website and school digital profile which includes online message system, journal and improved news system, a school Facebook page, Instagram, "Chesoebox", YouTube and Schooltube channels, allows for ease of submission of assessments as well as ease of notifications of school events and other services to parents and students. This initiative is still in its early stages and will continue to be further developed under the expertise of Mr Criniti who has gained permanent employment at our school as an ESL teacher.

Significant changes to scaffolding of and backward design assessments assessment tasks across the school has led to more consistent learning outcomes being achieved by all students. We also provide our community school with an online Assessment Hub on our school's website for parents and students. Here we have 7-10 Assessment uploaded all Year Schedules and tasks for the year. Parents and students of all Stages can now access their assessment schedules and tasks online on our school website and parents are able to support their children more readily.

There has been a significant improvement in transition for all students at Cheso. There are taster lessons for all Year 5 students from our Primary schools. There is also an improved transition program for students from the IEC through the Maths Extension program and the Welcome program, which provides students with orientation into the school. Students have reported feeling relieved about starting High School by the fact that they already knew someone and were aware of the schools expectations and operations. Thank you to Ms Watts for her leadership in the program. Students are also better prepared for their transition out of school as they are assisted by the Transition Adviser, our wonderful Mrs Corcoran. Together they examine the various alternate pathways available to the students when they want to leave school. She also assists the students with job and TAFE applications and interviews and supports students by accompanying them to interviews if necessary. Our students and families are also supported in the subject selection process for Year 11 through our Retention This assists students in the Task Force. subject selection process by providing them with workshops, information evenings and Parent-Student-Head Teacher interviews to assist in the decision making process. Parents have indicated that they are most appreciative of this initiative as they feel valued and involved in the process.

Over the four years of the Partnership, links have been established and strengthened with our Primary Schools. Two of our Primary Schools accepted our offer of Sport Coaching by our senior students. There is an increased number of Primary School students and parents attending our Flag Day Ceremonies.

We have established Community of Schools Meetings (COS) each term and a Principal or Deputy from each of our Primary Schools attends these meetings. As a result, we are planning a combined Staff Development Day in 2014 to explore opportunities for team teaching across the schools and cooperative planning to develop expertise in teaching Literacy and Numeracy.

In a recent school survey, all teachers have indicated that one of the highlights of the funding was the opportunity to participate in Professional so many Development opportunities. Teachers have developed their understanding and skills in teaching and learning strategies in ESL Pedagogy through in-school workshops by an expert ESL teacher, the "TELL" Course and "Teaching Refugees in My Classroom". These teaching techniques are not only useful in the ESL classroom but staff have commented that there is an increased awareness of the teaching strategies that maximise all students' Through outcomes. the Middle Band Workshops and the HAC (High Achievers Class) Project, a large number of teachers have had the opportunity to develop their teaching and learning strategies aimed at the middle to higher band student. The employment of a Deputy Principal, a Head Teacher Engagement and a Head Teacher Teaching and Learning and a Technology Deputy Principal (0.2),has led professional learning opportunities for staff members in leadership roles. These staff members have played a crucial role in the implementation and leadership of programs to improve student outcomes and teacher skill enhancement.

Our parents and school community have been increasingly involved in our school through our fortnightly parent meetings, NAPLAN information evenings, parent excursions to TAFE, information workshops and parent community meetings. We currently hold a Vietnamese, Arabic, Pacifica, Karen and Aboriginal parent community meetings once per term, in addition to our Community Forum meetings which occur once a month. 20 parents from our Community of Schools participated in our school based Computing course run by Bankstown TAFE and CRS. These workshops trained parents in a Certificate III in Business, as well as providing them with a free laptop upon the completion of the program.

It has been a very busy and productive time under the Low SES National Partnership Program. Our school community is definitely reaping the rewards from this funding. We are confident that our students and school community will continue to benefit from these initiatives beyond the Partnership thanks to the innovative and sustainable approaches and initiatives.



# IF YOUR CHILD HAS ANAPHYLAXIS SHOULD HE OR SHE CARRY THEIR OWN EPIPEN® OR ANAPEN® TO AND AT SCHOOL?

If you have told the school that your child is diagnosed a risk of anaphylaxis you should have received a letter from Mr Miller (Principal)

# What is an EpiPen® and an Anapen®?



EpiPen® and Anapens® are the emergency treatment for children who are having an anaphylactic reaction.

# What is Anaphylaxis?

Anaphylaxis is a severe and sometimes sudden allergic reaction. If your child has been diagnosed by a doctor as being at risk of anaphylaxis there are some important things to remember that will help the school to support your child's health care needs.

Why you need to keep us informed if your child is diagnosed as being at risk of anaphylaxis or if his or her condition changes. This includes if they have an anaphylactic reaction while not at school.

The school can only respond to risks it knows about. Please keep the office informed so that we can plan to support your child at school.

Why you need to provide the school with your child's current ASCIA Action Plan for Anaphylaxis and an EpiPen® or Anapen® signed by their doctor. The plan sets out the steps the school needs to follow in an emergency. It is essential for us to have this to keep your child safe.

We will keep a copy of your child's ASCIA Action Plan for Anaphylaxis stored with your child's EpiPen® or Anapen®.

It is important to regularly talk with your child about when and where they are at risk of contact with the things they are allergic to and how to avoid this. If you have told them not to take part in sharing food at school, regularly remind them of this.

Reassure them that if they do come into contact with something they are allergic to or they feel unwell at school they won't get into trouble. They need to tell a teacher immediately.

If your child has been diagnosed with anaphylaxis you can request that they carry their own EpiPen® or Anapen® to school and at school. A request form has been sent home and is also available from the office.

If you request that your child carry an EpiPen® or Anapen® with them to school and at school you will still need to provide the school with at least one additional EpiPen® or Anapen® for storage in a central location

within the school and for access by staff in an emergency.

The school will contact you about any request you make for your son or daughter to carry their own EpiPen® or Anapen®.

Staff need to know your child carries an EpiPen® or Anapen® in an emergency. For this reason this information will be included in your child's individual health care plan.

They also need to be able to find it quickly so it is important that it be in an easily identifiable and accessible spot (eg. not a locker).
