

#### **Award Winners**



Two CHHS teachers have been the recipient of the UNSW Education Faculty Awards for outstanding supervision of student teachers. The two teachers, **Ms Abdulhadi** and **Mr Viller** were presented with

their awards at a prestigious ceremony at UNSW where the manager of the NSW Board of Studies, Ms Carol Taylor, gave the formal address. CHHS has hosted 27 student teachers this year.



Invariably, they all comment on what an excellent professional learning experience they had at our school. This kind of feedback demonstrates that CHHS staff, curriculum and welfare policies are highly regarded in the wider educational community.

#### **Helmsman Project 2014**

In late November, over 100 of the CHHS community gathered at the University of Western Sydney to be part of the 2014 Helmsman Project. This Project involves coaching sessions for individual students who are then given the responsibility of learning to sail and navigate an ocean-going yacht. The students are then expected to mentor other students at our school. To be part of the program, students, parents or both had to attend the information session. They have to complete a detailed application form outlining their personal qualities and why they should be in the program. Entry into the program is very competitive. The really



exciting news is that 36 CHHS (current Yr.8) students will be part of the program in 2014. The fantastic turnout of students and parents is again strong evidence of the tremendous community spirit that exists here at CHHS. I would like to thank **Ms Pikoulas** for her commitment to this program.

#### **New Website**

In late December, our new website will be launched. While it contains most of the features of the old site, the website has greatly increased capacity to communicate and to interact with our community. We have tried to develop the website to meet future demands. 
#### **ABCN Scholarship to Aardash Prasad**



#### PROTECT YOURSELF FROM MIGRATION FRAUD

The Department of Immigration and Citizenship is warning people who have migrated to Australia, or are on temporary visas, to be aware of immigration-related scams. These scams can come in many forms, and are usually based on your fear of being deported.

In one scam, a visa holder receives a telephone call from someone pretending to be from the Australian government. This person says there is a problem with the visa holder's 'Citizenship and Immigration Services Alien' (CISA) number or card. The caller will then ask the visa holder to pay an upfront fee – about \$900 – so that he or she cannot be deported.

There is no such thing as a CISA number. The telephone caller may have your personal details, including your birth date and nationality, but this information can be found online in a number of places e.g. social networking sites.

The Australian Government will never call to demand a payment in relation to your visa to avoid you being deported. If you receive such a call, HANG UP. Protect yourself

If you receive a phone call from someone who says he or she is from the government and is asking you to pay money upfront to avoid deportation, just hang up. If you have any concerns about your visa, contact the Department of Immigration and Citizenship directly using their official contact details, which are available at http://www.immi.gov.au/

Be aware – just because someone seems to have a lot of information about

you, it does not mean they are real. Scammers go to a lot of trouble to find out information about the people they want to trick.

Never give your personal details to a stranger – a scammer could use your details to commit identity fraud (i.e. pretending to be you to open bank accounts or get credit cards)

Never send money to a stranger by using a money order, a wire transfer or an international funds transfer. You will almost never get your money back if it is sent in this way.



This is to let you know about an important, government funded community service that many members of our school community have access to, but may not be aware of this.


