PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Now that Term 3 is well underway, there is serious focus centred on supporting Year 12 through their final weeks and preparing Year 11 for entry into a most significant year in their lives. The High Achievers' Morning Tea has celebrated excellence and dedication to academic performance across all year groups.

With the commencement of Term 3, I have also celebrated my first year anniversary at the helm of Chester Hill High



School. The year has passed so quickly that it feels like yesterday I was the new kid on the block. And yet Cheso is most definitely home now. I look forward to the vears to come and seeing your children graduate prepared for the future.

One thing that has been weighing

heavily on the minds of our teachers and Senior Executive is the importance of Reports, Reporting and Parent Teacher Nights.

Much time is invested in compiling reports that accurately reflect your child's progress in order to facilitate improvements to their learning. We believe that maintaining high levels of parent awareness about student progress and promoting student accountability for their productivity is vital. No matter how much time passes, work ethic is key to success. No matter how much time passes, direct parent involvement, particularly during adolescence, is vital for student wellbeing and success.

While we understand that increasingly, parents have a



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multitude of demands on their time, nothing is more important than those occasions in the year when they are required to meet with us and oversee their child's learning and behaviour.

When half a year or a year passes and a report has not been picked up, students not only fail to progress, they regress. Students go backwards in their learning if parents do not supervise and monitor their learning at home.

Reports take hours to write and then edit. They are meant to be a mediating text for discussion between the school, parents and their children. Currently, my staff have asked me to review the format of our reports because they take so much time to compile and many are never seen. My staff have also expressed concern about how few parents attend Parent Teacher night, our Parent Forums and Information sessions.

It is difficult to justify to my staff why we should write detailed reports if our parent community do not value them. In order to determine the course of action we will take in relation to reports and our overall strategic directions for CHHS from 2018-2020, we will be engaging in community consultation. We would very much value your feedback so that we can improve our partnership for the benefit of our student community.

In the coming weeks, we will communicate with our community about how you can provide feedback in relation to planning to address core matters within the school. One of these feedback opportunities will be about the customer service we provide and involves completing an online survey. Parents can access this survey via email. If we do not have your email, register it with the office so we can send you the link. Another way to provide feedback is by attending our Parent Forum in the library. In Term 3, it will be held in Week 5. We look forward to your responses.

YEAR 10 CONNECT PROGRAM

Five Year 10 Cheso students were invited to participate in ASPIRE Connect. This event was a three-day academic enrichment event which took place from 27-29 June. The event aimed to show students the connection between subjects taken at school, courses studied at university and the possible career opportunities that can open up from gaining a degree.

Students chose a subject area in which they were interested and participated in a range of on-campus faculty workshops in that area. These included looking at environmental and social issues through gene development, solving legal issues, visiting exhibitions, developing creative works of art, designing towers and testing their physical limits in the exercise lab.

Students spent a day visiting workplaces and organisations such as the Australian Film, Television and Radio School (AFTRS), the Reserve Bank of Australia, the City of Sydney, Google, NSW Parliament House, the Opera House, the Children's Cancer Institute, who all generously opened their doors for behind the scenes tours.

Students were able to interact with staff who spoke about their own careers and shared their journey to university and beyond. Students were able to hear that everyone's experience is different and the pathways to university don't always go in a straight line.

Back on campus the following day, students were given more information about university, scholarships, entry schemes and study skills.

To bid everyone farewell, students were invited to participate in a performance by "Sound Your Voice". Students composed their own lyrics and were combined to make a short song that was performed by 130 students. Students walked away with a graduation token from the University of NSW.

Topics covered included:


- Goal Setting
